Church Recording

An article similar to this has been printed in the June Cranleigh Parish magazine, for those not of the parish perhaps you would like to hear of our progress.

We are a group of enthusiastic volunteers involved in extensive research and recording the complete interior contents of St Nicolas. This covers many facets such as discovering the craftsmen and women whose skills produced the stained glass, from William Morris to the present day. Tracing the history of those mentioned in the many memorials we have discovered who created these everlasting tributes and the bereaved families who were the donors.

We have uncovered who crafted the metal work and the history is behind the carved wood in the church. Textiles, stonework, books, bells, music, paintings, the list is very comprehensive.



Many hours have been spent researching, measuring, dating, writing descriptions, photographing, checking documents both historical and those more recent. It is time consuming but very informative and enjoyable task. We still have some way to go before all is ready for the final compilation. When it is printed a bound hardback copy will be given to St Nicolas Church, a disc stored in the V & A Museum and a copy given to Church House in London.

I thought you may like to see some of us at work in the Chapter House, Guildford Cathedral. Though not all the group were present, there may be faces you will recognise.



Young Arts

All five members of the Young Arts team took part in the Art Week at St Cuthbert Mayne Catholic Primary School this June.

The whole school was spending the week studying different aspects of Joseph Wright's famous painting "An Experiment on a Bird in the Air Pump" and Art Coordinator, Kate Woodhams, had asked for our help. We prepared lessons for Years 5 and 6, taking a slightly different approach with each group, but in both cases portraiture was the main focus. It's a very powerful painting and the children were quickly engaged in discussions about how Wright portrayed the ten characters' reactions to the potentially lethal experiment, as well as his use of chiaroscuro to capture the heightened drama of the scene.



The lively Q&A sessions were followed by a drawing lesson. Each pupil chose one of the painting's characters to sketch. Our explanations of the proportions of the face were aided with illustrated worksheets and those, together with our help in explaining basic techniques of shading, resulted in a wide variety of portraits. As our time with them was limited, these the children will develop in future classes. It wasn't all serious, of course, along the way the children also had fun acting out various facial expressions. We, too, enjoyed our time with such responsive, well behaved children.

Anthea has worked in the UK and the USA. Her special interests are architecture and design of the 20th and 21st Centuries which of course must include Thomas Heatherwick.

November 24th 2018 – Julian Richards – Inspired by Stonehenge – a special interest day

Julian is returning to Cranleigh for our annual Special Interest Day. He is known in archaeological circles as Mr Stonehenge. His own collection of materials, related to Stonehenge, are currently on display at the visitors centre at the Stonehenge site. This means we can rely on accurate information about the area which has been a source of mystery over the years.
